
A Burning Ambition - Mastering Pyrography

Bob studied Art and Design at Cardiff College of Art and at Birmingham University and was Head of Creative Design in a Community College for may years before setting up his own business in South Derbyshire.

After leaving Art College and during his teaching career, Bob continued with his large abstract paintings and metal sculpture. In the early 1970's Bob was part of the revival of traditional crafts such as enameling, pewter work and woodturning. This was the beginning of Craft Fairs. Dale Larson lives in Gresham, Oregon and has been turning wood for 43 years. He specializes in turning bowls from local hardwoods, including Pacific Madrone and Big Leaf Maple. His work is both functional and beautiful and much admired by collectors and wood workers alike. His bowls can be found in private collections all over the world.

Dale has taught woodturning classes at John C. Campbell Folk School and Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts. He has been a demonstrator at five AAW Symposiums, eight regional symposia, and numerous local chapters, as well as international events in England and Israel. He has written articles about

wood and woodturning in American Woodturner, World of Wood, Woodworker West, Woodturning Design, and Lecho des Copeaux (AFTAB France).

He currently serves on the board of the Larch Mountain Country Artisans and the Board of Advisors of the AAW. In 2019, Dale was named an AAW Honorary Lifetime Member. He served on the Board of Directors of the AAW from 2009 through 2014 as Symposium chair and three years as President. He is a past president of the Northwest Chapter of the International Wood Collectors Society and a founding member and twice past president of the Cascade Woodturners in Portland, Oregon.

NEOWTA members, turn a pen for the troops!


Would you like to help turn pens? We now have pen kits that you can check out at the monthly meeting and take home to turn! Just bring them back to the next monthly meeting.

LEARN TO TURN

Beginning Turning Classes

We have a maximum of 8 and a minimum of 5 students per class. You will receive a lot of individual attention. Classes will be populated on a first come first served basis.

Outline of classes

Class 1

Introduction to the Lathe, Personal Safety Techniques, Equipment, Tools, Holding Tools, Body Position, Habits.

Learning to cut small beads and coves.

Tools: Roughing Gouge, Parting tool, 3/8" Spindle Gouge or 3/8", Bowl Gouge.

Project: Beads & Coves

Class 2

Review of Safe Procedures, Holding tools, Body Position.

Cutting larger, smoother, beads and coves. Making a tenon to fit a Chuck.

Tools: Roughing Gouge, Parting Tool, 3/8 or 1/2" Spindle or Bowl Gouges.

Projects: Make a Christmas Tree. Make a dibbler (or dibble if your prefer).

Class 3

Review of Safe Procedures

Platter design, shaping, making smooth cuts.

Practice Turning; Small vase "Dry Weed Pot".

Tools: Same as Class 1 and 2 + round nose or bowl scraper (if you have one).

Project: Make a small platter—additional methods to attach wood to the lathe.

Class 4

Review of Safety. Review of cuts.

Turning a Small bowl from green wood.

Class Evaluations.

How to join the class

- 1. You must be a member of NEOWTA to take the classes.
- 2. We will have four classes on successive Thursdays or Sundays as the case may be. (To allow you to practice!)
- 3. The total cost is only \$140. That is only \$35 per class. This is very inexpensive as wood turning classes go.
- 4. People who have taken the class previously have appreciated the instructors and the feeling of confidence that they gained from the experience. Even if you have some self taught experience, it is likely that you will benefit from this class because you will benefit from not needing to make all the mistakes yourself.
- 5. All classes are in the NEOWTA (heated and air-conditioned!) classroom using one of our full sized lathes. All wood, tools, and equipment required for the class will be furnished—even sandpaper! But you are invited to bring your own face shield and tools if you wish. If you do not have tools, please do not buy them before the first class.
- 6. Each class is approximately 3 to 4 hours in duration.
- 7. The instructors are experienced and will demonstrate each step prior to student practice.
- 8. Safety is emphasized throughout all classes. We want you to go home with something that you made, not a lump or cut!
- 9. Students are expected to clean up their work stations at the end of each class.
- 10. We have been using the same basic curriculum for the past 4 years but our teaching techniques continue to evolve and improve based on feedback from previous students. We want you to be comfortable and we want you to learn.

BEADS OF COURAGE

Making boxes for the Beads of Courage program at the Children's Hospital at St. Francis Hospital is an ongoing community service project for our club.

Beads of Courage is a program for children who are seriously ill with cancer or other serious disease. The beads help them tell their treatment stories through the colored beads they receive for medical procedures, treatment milestones, and acts



of bravery. Children can amass hundreds of beads during their treatment and typically string them together to form necklaces.

Our project is to turn lidded boxes for the children to use to store their beads and necklaces. Club members are encouraged to turn boxes that are between 4 and 6 inches in diameter and 6 to 8 inches tall. Box design is up to the club member. Be creative and remember these boxes are for kids. We would like some reference to Beads of Courage to be incorporated in your design.

AAW Annual International Woodturning Symposium Chattanooga, Tennessee June 23 - 26, 2022

The 2022 AAW Symposium is scheduled for June 23 - 26 in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The normal registration cost for AAW members for the full, three day event is \$345 if paid by June 1.

The AAW is offering a \$30 discount for people who participate in group registration through their local AAW chapter. We need to get a headcount to see how many GRWG members are interested in this option.

Some key points:

- We would need at least 10 people to participate to be eligible for the discount. And we need to tell the AAW by February 1 if we will be participating.
- The group registration through the GRWG would cost \$315 per person. Your payment (by check, no credit card option) would be due by mid March. Someone from the GRWG will collect the checks and send them to the AAW.
- The AAW will announce "Covid mitigation protocols", such as masking or vaccination requirements, before the event. They will provide full refunds to people who decide not to attend due to the protocols.

AAW SAFETY

Your First Bowl Gouge

Options abound but it's best to start with the basics WE ARE TEACHING THE WORLD TO TURN



or a beginner, buying turning tools can be a daunting task. Do you choose high-carbon steel, high-speed steel (HSS), or powdered metallurgy? What about cryogenically treated tools? Out of the confusion of tools available, which one do you really need? Sometimes it depends on what you turn, but even then, every turner seems to have a different opinion.

Before making a recommendation, I asked turners from beginner to professional what they own and what they would recommend for a beginner. Almost all recommended a 3/8" or 1/2" bowl gouge.

It's important to note that English gouges are designated by flute width while American gouges measure the diameter of the shaft. A 1/2" American gouge is about the same as a 3/8" English tool, so it's possible some turners were actually recommending the same tool.

What steel?

Because high-carbon steel doesn't hold an edge and carbide is too hard to sharpen, most professionals favor high-speed steel and powdered- metallurgy tools.

You won't find new gouges manufactured from high-carbon steel or carbide. You'll choose between standard HSS (most are M2) and high-wear steels (often in powdered metal) like 2030, 2060, A11, and V15. Although cryogenically treated tools offer an advantage in edge holding, they are expensive for a beginner.


The bowl gouge will become the most versatile tool in your toolbox. With a properly ground bowl gouge you can rough-turn a bowl, form the outside and hollow the interior, and shear-scrape it to a smooth finish. The gouge is also fine for roughing end-grain boxes and hollowing vases. (It tends to scrape rather than cut end grain.)

Some turners prefer a V-shaped flute, some a U-shaped flute, while others prefer the superflute, a shape somewhere between a V and a U. I have all three types at my lathe and find only minor advantages of one over the others. For a beginner, proper sharpening is more important than flute shape.


What profile?

Bowl gouges are available with tips ground to the manufacturer's standard profile or to a special profile developed by any of several well-known professional turners. The tip profile most often recommended for a beginner is the transition or fingernail grind. After experience (50-plus bowls), you may want to try the Irish (also known as the Celtic or Ellsworth) grind.


Using the Oneway Wolverine Sharpening System with the Vari-Grind Jig is an easy way to form a similar shape. Fundamentals of Sharpening, an AAW video, has excellent instructions on three techniques for sharpening a bowl gouge, making it easy to choose a method that works best for you. (For details, see woodturner.org/products.) The angles shown are typical ranges.



A traditional grind has some sound applications: the outside of a face grain bowl when mounted backward (base is at tailstock side) or for opening the interior of a bowl (opening is now facing tailstock side).

Irish Grind

Experienced turners may prefer the more complicated Irish grind. it's a good tool for roughing bowls, detailing (with the elliptical front), shear-scraping, and smoothing the transition from sides to bottom.

I'm confident that a 3/8" or 1/2" HSS or powderedmetal bowl gouge with a transition grind will get any beginning turner started on the road to enjoying bowl turning.


